The Clerk is instructed to contact Highways to enquire as to the reason for Tramway Road streetlights removal and ascertain when they will be returned. **Mr Beddis** will be contacted & informed of the outcome of said communication with Highways.

Adam Taylor - Sneyd Wood estate. Thanked Parish Council for September's speed survey, remained at the meeting to speak to council on item 12.11, SNEYD WOOD VAS & 12.12, SNEYD WOOD ANPR.

Adrian Peacey, Tony Smith, Richard Carpenter, Alan Beddis, Lisa Hype - All attended to lobby, demand action and support from the Parish Council due to recent bus routes being cancelled in the parish. The aforementioned public were invited to remain and join the discussion on agenda item 12.14, PARISH BUSES.

Charlie Johnson - From Cinderford Ladies Football Club, enquiry regarding use of Ruspidge RWT football field and facilities. The Ladies club would like to become the resident club. RWT trustees welcomed the club and invited them to take up residency. Also, invited by the Chairman to participate in the RWT Agenda.

RUSPIDGE WELFARE TRUST

Members were mindful that these items were considered and determined as trustees to the RWT.

- 12.2. **Cost Increase Per Match played on Ruspidge Football ground**. £30.00 proposed & agreed by majority of trustees. Cinderford Ladies Club have agreed to this per-match fee of £30.00.
- 12.3. **Ruspidge Football Club Facilities Maintenance.** Trustees have authorised repair & repainting of the outside roofs of the cabins. Rubberise or felt being a potential solution.

Water to be re-connected, electrical inspection to be undertaken, plumbing & boiler to be inspected. The playing field will require rolling, Parish Council Clerk to contact & arrange for these services to be actioned. **Cinderford ladies Club** the new resident club, will undertake the painting of the inside & outside of the cabins, cabins to be painted in club colours, **RWT** trust will reimburse material costs. The **Ladies Club** will also undertake the pitch line markings either by using line marking equipment owned by the **RWT** or supplying their own/hiring a service at their cost. The **Ladies Club** can adjust goal posts to meet regulation standards at the club's discretion.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

- 12.8. Following report by the Treasurer the council **APPROVED** the accounts presented for **December** payment totalling **£29,338.32**, this figure being inclusive of confidential expenditure.
- 12.9. **PRESENT DRAFT BUDGET** The Parish Council unanimously approved the amended 2023/24 draft budget.
- 12.10. INSTANT ACCESS SAVER ACCOUNT To protect the Parish Council Finances the RFO advice's opening an additional savings account for general reserves to ensure public money is protected through the Financial Services Compensation Scheme (FSCS). Parish Council members present unanimously approved opening an additional account as per the RFO's advice.
- 12.11. SNEYD WOOD VAS Parish Council members considered a request from the public & the police for the placement of a VEHICLE ACTIVATED SIGN (VAS) on Sneyd Wood Road. Also, possible relocation of an existing Parish VAS. Parish Council members declined the request for a VAS or to move an existing VAS. Stating the reason; there are already three VAS sited in the Parish and they have proved ineffective at discouraging motorists from Speeding.
- 12.12. SNEYD WOOD ANPR Parish Council members to consider the benefits of an AUTOMATIC NUMBER PLATE RECOGNITION camera (ANPR) on Sneyd Wood Road and seek potential ANPR grant funding. Members present discussed the merits of ANPR over VAS as a possible solution for Sneyd Wood Road.
 Members present uppnimeusly agreed and proposed ANPR for Sneyd Wood Road.

Members present unanimously agreed and proposed **ANPR** for Sneyd Wood Rd.

The Clerk is instructed to seek funding for the aforementioned ANPR on Sneyd Wood Rd.

12.13. **SOUDLEY BRIDGE REPAIRS** - The Parish Council, given the information presented by Gloucestershire County Council & Forestry Commission England, informed the Chairman of Soudley Village Hall **(SVH)** present at the meeting, that the Bridge on Lower Road Soudley and the land to the front of the Hall is owned by **SVH**.

It is established that the urgent issue for the bridge is the repair/replacement of the handrails. Future refurbishment of the bridge 'steel supports' and decking will be required, but not urgent.

The Chairman of **SVH** was advised that the Village Hall committee seek grant funding and appoint contractors at their discretion to undertake repairs to the bridge. The **PC** will contribute to said funding to be considered at a later date.

Recycling Centre on SVH land. It is uncertain as to who initially gave consent for the recycling centre sited on SVH land. The Clerk is requested to confirm instruction from **SVH** to Biffa, to have the recycling bins removed from the **SVH** land.

12.14. **PARISH BUSES** - How can the Parish Council best serve its Parishioners regarding the recent cuts to bus routes.

Members of the public present at the meeting request the level of services are reinstated. Mr Adrian Peacey stated that at no point were the public consulted regarding proposed cuts and the impact on local communities considered.

The public present demand the Parish Council add its voice in support of the parishioners to bring pressure, contest the recent cuts and for future consultation in the form of a public meeting to be held within the parish, with Cllr. Philip Robinson present. The Parish Council requests the Clerk draft a letter for member approval and then to be sent to;

Cllr. Philip Robinson - Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Bus Transport. The Rt Hon Mark Harper MP - Secretary of State for Transport. GCC Cllr. Morgan will be copied into the email.

A pack has been made available (which I hope the PC has) regarding the Cost of Living Crisis, giving much advice and help. If you haven't got one, then please let me know.

We have now had Confirmation regarding the allocation of the UK Shared Prosperity fund of £1m over 3 years, with yr 1 receiving approx £120k, year 2 £ 240k and year 3 £640 on mainly revenue funding. We have projects identified. We are awaiting confirmation of the Rural England Prosperity Fund which is for Capital projects, and it is a much smaller amount.

I have heard nothing more about Forest Lodge, so I am still keeping an eye on things with regard to Planning, and I have asked our Officer to let me know when things change.

Report to Ruspidge & Soudley Parish Council – December 2022

S106 & CIL

FoDDC is the only District Council within Gloucestershire that has not adopted CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy). CIL and s106 are different to each other. District Councils have more control over CIL payments to GCC. In the last two years, GCC is millions of pounds short on contributions towards education and libraries, compared with previous years. The shortfall in funding has become an urgent and serious problem for GCC. Let me know if you would like the report.

SOSC meeting 3rd November

A bit more detail about this meeting than was in my last report:

- Waste Services Update. A study that was done in preparation for work on the new contract for waste collection was presented. This report will be more understandable within the context of the work that will be done on the different options and costings to be considered for the new contract, for which it is intended as a base line. The Waste Service Review will be considered at the December Cabinet meeting.
- Leisure Services Update from Freedom Leisure:

Freedom Leisure commenced a 10 year partnership with Forest of Dean District Council in 2015. This was originally to manage Cinderford, Coleford, Lydney, Newent and Sedbury. In 2018 the fitness suite at Cinderford was added to the contract and in October 2018 Coleford leisure centre was closed.

In March 2020, due to the national pandemic, all leisure centres were closed. Over the next 15 months the leisure centres were only open for around 3 months in total.

Pre pandemic memberships levels were at a record high. Membership levels are currently 3% above pre covid levels whereas the national average is around 15% below.

Learn to Swim Pre pandemic memberships levels were at a record high. Membership is currently 53% above pre covid levels with additional time slots for lessons added. It is difficult

to satisfy the demand for swimming lessons and general pool sessions. A new portal is in place where parents can track and monitor their child's progress.

Freedom Leisure have replaced such things as pool covers at all the pools and other pool equipment as necessary. Also additional fitness equipment purchased for Cinderford.

Energy usage is obviously an issue, with actions being taken at all sites to control temperatures of pools and rooms. However, temperatures must be compatible with people's health.

Active Communities / Healthy Communities – much work is being done, for example introducing GOGA (Get Out Get Active), launching youth sports clubs, a tots programme and disability programmes. Attendance has been excellent. For example, 60 – 70 young people attend Cinderford youth sports club every week. Freedom Leisure has started its own football league.

Five Acres briefing

The proposed site plan, ground floor plan and designs can be seen on the Council website: https://www.fdean.gov.uk/planning-and-building/regeneration/five-acres-redevelopment-site/

Phase 1 includes refurbishment of the existing curved 'Speedwell' building, plus a 4 court sports hall, 3 performance rooms, new toilets and changing rooms and a café. These spaces are to be linked with a new atrium area. There will also be new under cover cycle storage and an outdoor seating area in this first phase. An expansion area for a possible future swimming pool building and space for a possible future hotel as also shown on the plans, (for a possible future phase) with the rest of the front area shown as taken up with186 car parking spaces in addition to the existing 27 car parking spaces – however these numbers are indicative. The sports hall could have retractable bleacher seating and a removable stage installed in future if funds become available.

Phase 2 includes 4 new tennis courts, a 3G sports pitch, a new sports pavilion with changing rooms, toilets and storage, plus overflow parking on grass are proposed. Funding is not currently secured.

The business case for phase 1 will be presented at the December Cabinet meeting, but it will be exempt business. I believe that will then be considered at the December Full Council meeting, presumably again as exempt business.

Cost of Living Crisis briefing

The briefing included the information on the Council website, that I outlined last month. Hopefully a poster will be produced for village halls etc. Leaflets have been sent to those on the Council's database as receiving benefits – this has telephone numbers as well as website links.

There was also information on the Household Support Fund Delivery Plan, which is one of the funds that individuals can apply for on the council website.

Also, information on 'A Warm Welcome', which is a fixed amount of funding to be shared among community groups to enable them to provide warm spaces for the community.

Information for householders and landlords on funding to reduce energy use, plus an overview of the health impacts of the cost of living crisis completed the information pack.

Additionally, local food projects are being mapped. If you know of any community food growing or community eating projects, please get in touch in case they haven't yet been mapped. The list also includes an emergency/crisis food category and a sustainable eating category.

Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF).

Forest of Dean District Council has been indicatively allocated £614,444 over two years, starting in April 2023.

Under the Communities and Place UKSPF/REPF investment theme, early thoughts are that the REPF capital funding could help to boost the Council led Public Toilet Improvement project – where £243,590 is already allocated from UKSPF. A condition survey has been commissioned to understand the extent of the works and what refurbishment costs may look like. REPF could provide a useful top up and help upgrade all 4 town centre toilets and potentially include the

2 cemetery toilets in this scheme.

The Council led Active Travel Strategy & Action Plan project has been allocated £155,500 from UKSPF. This funding will support strategy preparation work, enable technical feasibility work and planning application preparation to progress new cycle routes. The REPF could offer an opportunity to help with delivery and build out some of these routes.

Under the "Support for Local Business" UKSPF/REPF investment theme, the Council led Business Grants & Loans project has been allocated £120,000 from UKSPF. REPF could provide a useful top up and allow this new grant and loan programme to be expanded to include REPF interventions eg. Food and farming sector support; community growing projects; and, village hall improvements (digital, energy efficiency, decarbonisation, accessibility).

REPF could provide an opportunity for the Council to work with Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) and existing local community transport providers to understand the gaps in provision. REPF may provide a mechanism to support organisations seeking to improve the transport offer and create sustainable solutions to support people struggling to access school, college, and

training locations or access shops and services within towns and village centres. A sustainable transport initiative may help to reduce the need to travel out of area, reduce car miles and support local retail, service and hospitality businesses.

Collaborative working with Cotswold District Council, Stroud District Council and Tewkesbury Borough Council is recommended.

Budget Strategy

Government has not yet informed Local Authorities of the support that they will receive.

Publica Annual Report

We had a briefing with Publica on their Annual Report. Searching questions were asked about why Publica has lost so many good quality experienced staff recently. In my view, adequate answers were not received. I asked for a report (without names) on the 'exit interviews' that were undertaken but was told that this would not be provided.

Report to Ruspidge & Soudley Parish Council – December 2022

The County Council and the Domestic Abuse Partnership Board are continuing their work to prevent violence towards Women and Girls, by taking part in 16 Days of Action in the international campaign aiming to become 'White Ribbon' accredited.

The Winter Holiday Activity booking is now open from the 1st December, families can now book a range of fun, festive activities to help keep children and young people active, entertained and enjoying healthy meals during the Christmas school holidays, local partners FAVF are helping the County here in the Forest to make this possible.

A new £1.6 million unit for children with social and mental health needs (SEMHD) this will be provided here in the Forest at the Heart of the Forest Special School at Speech House and is part of larger amount of money being spent across Gloucestershire.

The go-ahead has been given for the first Police, Fire & Rescue Stations with Newent and Winchcombe Stations to be used this way.

A New Diagnostic Centre is set to open in the Autumn, the £15 million Centre the first in the South West that will be in the County Council owned building at Quayside can now get underway with Kier being the contractor.

Locally I have have been working with Mr Adrian Peacy of Ruspidge to try to resolve this situation caused by Stage Coach withdrawing its services effectively cutting off the Villages of Ruspidge & Soudley, a protest was staged at Cinderford over the loss of these services, and I have contacted Councillor Philip Robinson Cabinet member responsible at Shire Hall to ask if the Buckshaft service could be extended to take in these two Villages.

I have also trying to find out what has happened to the VAS sign at Cinderford Bridge which has recently disappeared, I have made inquiries to Highways, Cinderford Town Council and the Police to try to find out what has happened to it.

I will try and keep you updated but the best place to check is: <u>Roadworks - Highways</u> (<u>gloucestershire.gov.uk</u>) note: closed roads still allow access for residents.

New Road in Blakeney is due to open on the 23rd December! It has been closed since February 2021. Many people will be very happy about this, particularly those that have been having heavier traffic because of the closure. However, there are works that have not been happening because it has been closed for so long so

- 4th to 25th January road from A48 to Viney Hill will be closed as far as Pine Tree way. This is for Gigaclear.
- 6th January for a month, Soudley to Blakeney will be closed then again later in the spring for another month, although I am sure this is subject to change. This is for Gigaclear to come through.
- Access for residents will be maintained for both these roads.
- Awre road will be closed near Blakeney 25th to 27th January
- Various road works on the A48 in the centre of Blakeney until the 22nd December
- All saints, Blakeney Hill and Pitching Green all due for Gigaclear work in the new year too. No roads are due to be shut but expect delays.
- Traffic lights in various places along the A48 between Blakeney and Newnham until mid-February
- Dean Road between Newnham and Littledean closed until 14th December.
- Other areas have road works on going but with traffic lights and delays rather than closures. Please see link above for more detail.

Highways Local money

I am waiting for a report from Highways on the work completed as part of the highway's local money, I do know they did some grass cutting in Bream and allowed water to get to the drains around the Awre area.

The pavement between Broadoak and Blakeney, where it exists, has now been cleared so that it is safer to walk along.


Bus services

Stagecoach has given the following statement about busses in the Forest of Dean:

Changes to the Forest of Dean network from 20th November 2022:

From Sunday 20th November, we'll no longer be operating the following contracted routes: Service 25, 27, 710, 748, 755, 761.

We'll also no longer operate contracted journeys on the Service 24 between Cinderford and Chepstow. The route of the Service 24 will be adjusted to provide



connections between Gloucester, Cinderford and Coleford, replacing journeys currently operating on the Service 25.

A Welsh bus company from Newport has now taken on the route from Lydney to Chepstow. I am in conversation with Glos Coll, Philip Robinson and Lydney dial a ride about how young people are to get to college in Cinderford from Blakeney Soudley and Newnham, if you know families effected by this do ask them to be in touch with me.

The Robin

Driven by Sloucestershire

The Robin, an on-demand minibus service has just started operating in the South of the Forest of Dean, the A40 to the north and Chepstow to the South being the boundaries of its operation.

The Robin can be booked over the phone, on line or you can download the app from the play store. It can be booked up to 2 weeks in advance or an hour in in advance. The idea is that it will supplement stagecoach bus services especially in villages with no bus service. It will not take you to Gloucester but it will take you to the A48 or Littledean to catch a bus to Gloucester. Lydney dial a ride won the contract. There are 2 minibuses in operation. I have used it twice and it has been very efficient, an excellent service.

The Restoring our Rivers Task Group report <u>Final report with annexes.pdf (gloucestershire.gov.uk)</u> The state of our rivers is largely down to water companies not maintaining infrastructure which leads to storm overflows being used too often and the Environment Agency not being funded enough to be able to enforce the existing legislation. Intensive agriculture also plays a part of our declining water quality with historical and ongoing over loading of the land with phosphorous from intensive poultry units. Cheap food comes at a cost to our environment.
