

<u>Covid.</u> Hopefully, this will be the last time the newsletter starts with Covid! Most people in the higher risk category have been vaccinated twice and the local NHS is making good progress on the rest, many of whom have had the first dose. By the time of the next issue (1st July) we will be just a few weeks away from a total lifting of restrictions. We hope!

Speeding. Drivers Speeding through our Parish continue to be a menace. In this issue we publish the Traffic Report for the Winter and early Spring just. The report is produced from recordings made by our three Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS), As you can see, speeds remain high, especially increased in Soudley, as is the volume of traffic due to the Blakeney road closure. It is usually the lowest - now the highest!

The highest speed recorded was once again on Buckshaft Road - 80mph, recorded at 15 mins past midnight, on 11th February. If it was you, you qualify for the dubious honour of being the **Most Dangerous Idiot** of the year!

<u>Wild Boar.</u> As the Editor, I was recently received a 'readers letter', asking me to spread the word about the dangers posed by wild boar. She recounts an incident whilst walking her dog in the Forest. Her dog was on an extending lead when, in an enclosed pathway, it pounced on a large boar, hidden in the ferns. The boar retaliated by attacking the dog and chasing it. The dog hid behind its owner as the boar continued its attack. The owner was hit on the leg as the boar pursued the dog. A 'well aimed kick and a loud yell persuaded the boar to cease, and it disappeared into the undergrowth.

This is a common tale but one worth repeating. Boar are large animals and capable of doing a great deal of damage. They particularly hate dogs (perhaps through the ages recognising them as wolves, their only predator?) and will attack, and kill a dog if roused, particularly if accompanied with their young. This action is perfectly natural and should be expected. There are no verified accounts of boar attacking humans but incidents such as this are recorded.

The Forest is a wild place, full of wild creatures, and we are all the more richer for it. Folk should remember that when we walk through the Forest, we 'invade' their territory - sometimes with our domesticated creatures. They (dogs) must be kept on a tight lead, particularly in tight spaces. To do otherwise is to risk losing your dog and even being injured yourself.

This reminder is especially timely now. During lockdown there has been an explosion of puppy sales and the number of dogs in general - often owned by folk who have no knowledge of the Forest or dogs.

Finally, a word to dog owners in general - it may surprise you that not everybody loves dogs! Dogs which habitually jump up on strangers whilst they visit the forest are a real nuisance. I recall being molested by a huge Great Dane. It bounded towards me and ended up with its front paws on my shoulders and its head level with mine - just inches away. After its owner covered the 100 yards or so to me, he called it off, and laughed whilst announcing that "he's only playing". I did not find it at all funny, nor did I appreciate the mud on my coat! A lot of old and frail people walk in the Forest. Such a shock could cause real harm!

To all folk who walk their dogs in the Forest - please, KEEP IT ON A LEAD and UNDER Control!

Whilst on the subject of the Wild Boar, another reminder - please, **DON'T FEED THEM!!**

Old St White's School Buildings

We have been asked by members of the public why work is carrying on at the former school, despite the fact that one of the planning conditions imposed by FODDC was that no work should commence on site until the junction was improved.

The Parish Council notified planning immediately asking that they should serve an enforcement notice on the developer insisting that the junction improvement should be done first.

Planning's response was that it was a small local builder plus although it was a planning breach it was only minor. A District Councillor became involved on our behalf resulting in more feeble excuses from planning. A member of the public sent an excellent letter to the Forester about the case and work on site stopped soon after.

A month or so later, work recommenced. More letters from Parish and District Councillors. More excuses from planning one of which said the ongoing work was non disruptive. Well the only disruptive work to be done as far as the wider public is concerned is the junction improvement work itself.

We as a Parish are powerless to stop this abuse of regulations but we are not about to give up yet so watch this space.

One can only speculate why an authority who imposed the rule is doing so much to avoid enforcing its rule. You can make your own minds up on that one and perhaps tell us what you think?

Traffic problems in Soudley

Those living outside and travelling through Soudley will note a huge increase in the amount of traffic passing through the village - those living in Soudley are well aware! This is, of course, caused by the Blakeney Road closure - expected to be in place for another 12 months and possibly longer.

One of our new Councillors, Jo Smith has taken up the baton for Soudley and she will be contacting the relevant authorities with a view to easing the situation and slowing speed.

Speeding continues to be a problem in our Parish as in so many others. Unfortunately, there is insufficient enforcement of the law and as long as that remains the case, dangerous driving will persist.
